During the course, you have read about Carlos Marighella, one of the influential people in the world of terrorism. Your assignment is to read the **Mini-Manual of the Urban Guerilla** which was authored by Marighella.

After completing the reading, you will then write a 3-5 page paper and cover the following issues:

- How relevant is this document to the modern terrorist?
- Should a document such as this be banned? If so, why, if not, why not.
- What was the most shocking or unexpected item that you learned from the manual?
- How can legitimate government's fight against the spread of such a document and what kind of threat does it pose to a free people?

Support your thoughts and utilize at least 2 additional academic resources. The paper should be a 12 font with one inch margins and double-spaced.

This assignment is worth 100 points.

Presentation

There is a presentation. Each member of the class will research an international terrorist organization and prepare a 10 minute presentation. The presentation will cover the founding of the organization, the philosophy that drives it, what acts of note have they committed, and their threat level to the United States. Because this item is presented to the class – the topic must be cleared by the instructor so that we do not have duplication.

The assignment is worth 100 points.

Paper Assignment

There is also a 5-7 page paper to be completed in the class. For this assignment, you will research a domestic terrorist organization here in the United States. This organization or group can be from the past or the present but the important issue is that they are a domestic terrorist group – this excludes groups such as motorcycle gangs and drug cartels.

You will need to explain the origins of the group, the activities they have been involved with, their philosophy, development and why they pose a threat to the United States.

The paper should be 5-7 pages double spaced not counting the title page and bibliography. The font should be a 12 with one inch margins. You will need a minimum of 3 academic resources (resources such as Wikipedia are not acceptable). Do not go to the terrorist websites – stay strictly with academic resources for this project.

This assignment is worth 100 points.

Participation

With participation, showing up for class is not enough but actually discussing and participating. In regards to this, each week you will need to find an article related to terrorism will be brought to class to discuss the information and how it relates to terrorism and the threats the US faces.

Late work will automatically receive a 10% reduction in grade. So have your work in on time!
